### James Correnti, Pianist

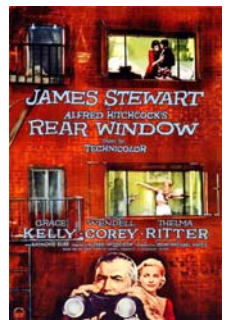
#### Tuesday, August 15 at 2 PM, FA

## Dialing Area Codes Encouraged

Start getting into the habit of dialing area code 717. Callers will need to enter 10-digit numbers by **August 26** or calls will not go through.

The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission approved the addition of the 223 area code in 2016 to address our region's dwindling stock of remaining phone numbers. Since the new 223 area code will cover the same geographic area as the 717 area code—York, Adams, Cumberland, Dauphin and Franklin counties and most of Lebanon and Lancaster counties—callers will soon need to include the area code to ensure calls go through.

It is a good idea to get in the habit of dialing the 10-digits now, to give yourself a chance to reprogram contacts on mobile devices to include the area code.

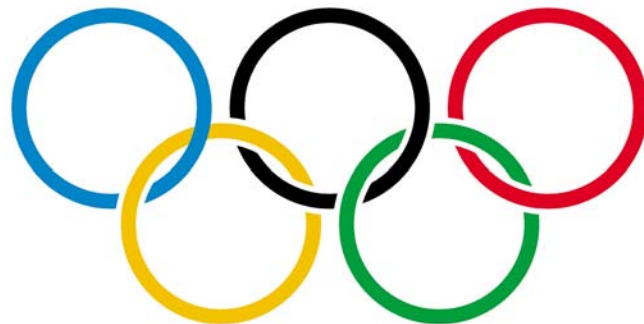

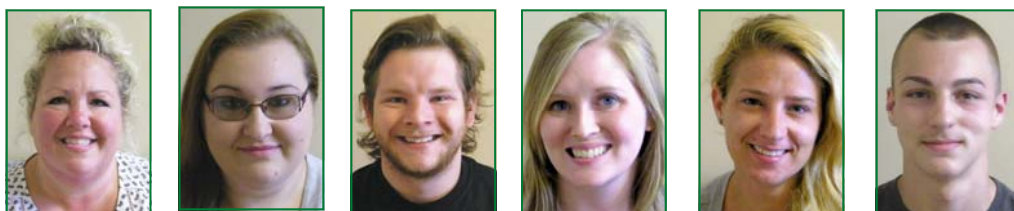
Yaleyka Martinez welcomed Liana Alice Martinez on July 7. Liana weighed 8lbs., 13 oz. and measured 21".
